### **COURSE FORMAT AND EXPECTATIONS**

The course is organized as follows:



- Each student will be required to prepare and present a 5-minute talk about a topic of their choice, a 20-minute seminar based upon extensive research work and literature surveys, in areas related to their current research, and a short 3-minute talk on their research topic.
- A one-hour seminar slot will be scheduled every week during the term, and 2 graduate students will present his/her research at each seminar (depending on the enrollment).
- The seminars will be held in person.
- The students are encouraged to discuss with their supervisors to identify a topic for the presentations.

- The student will give an outstanding seminar which stresses the background of their research topic (and may
  include some preliminary results if available) at a level that is both comprehensible and entertaining for their
  peers.
- The students will first provide a 5-minute presentation on a topic of their choice. This talk should include a) the name of the speaker, b) the title of the talk, c) the motivation for the topic, d) details about the topic, c) a summary highlighting the key points of the talk.
- Each research seminar should not last for more than 20 minutes (15 min talk followed by 5 min Q&A). It should cover:
  - i) The background motivation of your research topic.



- ii) Examples of the current state of the industry that is relevant to your topic.
- iii) The basic science underlying your topic.
- iv) The approach you are taking and the justification for your approach in your research.
- v) A few of your key research achievements if you already have them.
- vi) A brief summary and next steps.
- There will be a Q&A after each seminar.
- The students will first provide a 3-minute presentation on their research topic. This talk should focus on the main goal of the topic and build upon the feedback received.
- All other students will provide feedback regarding the presentations
- Each student will be required to attend and participate in at least 75% of the course seminars within the course.
- Each student will be required to provide feedback, comments/suggestions about each seminar they attend.

### SUBMISSION OF REQUEST FOR RELIEF FOR MISSED ACADEMIC WORK

In the event of an absence for medical or other reasons, students should review and follow the Academic Regulation in the Undergraduate Calendar "Requests for Relief for Missed Academic Term Work".

- 1. Relief for missed academic work worth less than 25% of the final grade resulting from medical or personal situations lasting up to three calendar days:
  - Use the <u>McMaster Student Absence Form</u> (MSAF) on-line self-reporting tool. No further documentation is required.
  - Students may submit requests for relief using the MSAF once per term.
  - An automated email will be sent to the course instructor, who will determine the appropriate relief. Students must immediately follow up with their instructors. Failure to do so may negate the opportunity for relief.
  - The MSAF cannot be used to meet a religious obligation or to celebrate an important religious holiday.



- The MSAF cannot be used for academic work that has already been completed attempted.
- An MSAF applies only to work that is due within the period for which the MSAF applies, i.e. the 3-day period
  that is specified in the MSAF; however, all work due in that period can be covered by one MSAF.
- The MSAF cannot be used to apply for relief for any final examination or its equivalent. See Petitions for Special Consideration above.
- 2. For medical or personal situations lasting more than three calendar days, and/or for missed academic work worth 25% or more of the final grade, and/or for any request for relief in a term where the MSAF has been used previously in that term:
  - Students must report to their Faculty Office to discuss their situation and will be required to provide appropriate supporting documentation.
  - If warranted, the Faculty Office will approve the absence, and the instructor will determine appropriate relief.
