Missed Work Policy:

- Quizzes: Students will write 12 Avenue-based quizzes (one per week), where
 the best 10 out of 12 will be counted toward their final mark. All quizzes must
 be written online during the scheduled time for the class. There are no rewrites. If you miss a quiz because of an emergency, you must contact the
 professor no later than the next business day and send an MSAF, otherwise
 you will be assigned a grade of zero for the quiz. If an MSAF has been
 submitted, the weight of the quiz will be added to the final exam.
- **Tests:** Students will write 3 tests in the term.
- All tests are to be written in person at the times announced unless
 alternative arrangements have been made previously between the student
 and the professor to cover exceptional circumstances. Students with special
 needs must inform the professor through McMaster Student Accessibility
 Services (SAS) office of their requirements at least <u>five days prior</u> to the test
 date so that alternative arrangements can be made.
- If you miss a test because of an emergency, you must contact the professor
 no later than the next business day and you are required to submit MSAF for
 missing test(s); otherwise, ZERO will be assigned to the grade. Students who
 fail to send MSAF will be considered "absentees" and will be assigned a
 grade of zero for the test.
- Subsequent missed tests will be rewritten at the end of the term (date to be
 announced later) in the form of either another test on that specific topic or an
 aggregate test consisting of all topics for the whole term. The specifics will be
 announced later in the term. MSAF tests may be given in any format, including
 traditional written tests or oral examinations.
- Students who fail a test will <u>not be permitted to rewrite</u> the test under any circumstances.
- All test/assignment/quiz marks will be posted on Avenue. It is your responsibility to report any discrepancies to your instructor before the last day of classes. No errors will be corrected unless reported by this time.
- Reviewing a test mark: Tests may be resubmitted to the instructor for re-mark
 up to one week after the test grade has been uploaded. Students must submit
 a detailed written description of the marking problem regarding their
 submission. However, the instructor has the right to remark the test in its

5. LEARNING OUTCOMES

- 1. Construct mathematical models for linear, R,L,C circuits.
- 2. Construct physical or virtual circuit implementations during lab exercises as well as test and monitor the circuit variables using digital multimeters and oscilloscopes.
- 3. Mathematically analyze R,L,C circuits to discern their behaviour and to quantify their electrical variables.
- 4. Apply MultiSim software to simulate circuit behaviour.
- 5. Apply complex analysis techniques, including phasors and impedances, to study AC circuit behaviour.
- 6. Understand the fundamental physical laws as they apply to electricity and electronics.
- 7. Illustrate practical applications for circuits and electronics.
