# 1. COURSE OBJECTIVES

This course focuses on the analysis, mechanics, as well as design principles and methods of prestressed concrete and structural steel for short to medium span highway bridges and other structural systems. Topics addressed in this course include the loads specific to bridge structures, the response of single and continuous span bridges to these loads, analysis and design of prestressed concrete girders, steel-concrete composite girders/floor systems, and steel plate girders. Students will also apply the bridge design standards to design prestressed concrete and steel bridge components and gain an understanding of the reasoning behind key code provisions.

#### 2. COURSE SPECIFIC POLICIES

<u>Course Materials:</u> Lecture-related documents (e.g., relevant code provisions, class examples) will be distributed via Avenue to Learn. These materials will be organized by teaching topics for easy reference. Students are expected to check Avenue to Learn daily to stay updated.

<u>Assignments:</u> Assignments must be submitted as a single electronic file to Avenue to Learn under Assessment > Assignment by the due date. Late submissions will incur penalties as follows: 1) From 0–48 hours late: 1% penalty per hour. 2) No submissions will be accepted after 48 hours.

Each assignment must include a cover page with the following information: Course title (e.g., CIV ENG 4Y04 – Bridges and Other Structural Systems), Assignment number (e.g., Assignment #3), Submission date, and Student name.

MSAF assignments will be extended for 48 hrs following their original due dates.

**Exams:** The date and time of the term test will be March 4, 10:30 am – 12:00 pm. The final exam will be 2.5 hours long and will take place during the designated final examination period. If a student misses the term test and submits an MSAF, their term test grade will be replaced by their final exam grade.
