

# Tips for a Successful Co-op Work Term

## Have an open mind and willingness to learn:

Everything will be new at first, and it may be challenging to adjust to the new environment. As you become more comfortable in your role, continue to keep the mindset of wanting to learn. Each day is different with new challenges and opportunities. Have an open-mind and be willing to learn even if it means you need to seek out new challenges.

## Ask questions and make your contribution

## Keep track of your accomplishments

Have a notebook and keep track of everything you have worked on and how you have contributed to your employer. This type of reflection will help with building your resume, preparing for future interviews and assist with your end of term reflection. It will also help you realize everything you have learned on your experience and all of your unique accomplishments.

## Build your network

Have conversations with your colleagues and build your network by keeping in touch after you have completed your co-op term. Connect with your colleagues on LinkedIn to expand your professional network. This will help when you begin your full-time job search as you approach graduation. Relationships are key to networking.
