Individual research project over two terms to be arranged by mutual consent of a faculty supervisor and the student with approval of the Department Associate Chair (Research).

COURSE WEBSITE/ALTERNATE METHODS OF COMMUNICATION

It is the student's responsibility to secure a supervisor for this course; if interested, please contact a professor for available projects. The supervisor is responsible for the immediate direction and instruction of the student and should commit a minimum of 30 minutes contact time per week, on average (noting that it will vary weekly).

COURSE INTENDED LEARNING OUTCOMES

By the end of this course, students should be able to:

- Critically review and briefly summarize the existing scientific literature on the topic
- Identify a research question including formulating a testable hypothesis, if applicable
- Design a research approach including identifying appropriate tools / techniques and/or apparatus
- Recognize assumptions and identify uncertainty in research methods
- Obtain a substantiated conclusion based on the results and recognizing limitations of the methods
- Effectively communicate results in a written scientific report and an oral presentation

COURSE FORMAT AND EXPECTATIONS

The course is organized as an independent research project. Each student is expected to meet weekly with their supervisor to provide progress updates and will complete a research project over the course of the year.

Generative AI is a tool that may be used in limited context within this course. Please read the article "Best practices for using AI when writing scientific manuscripts, Buriak et al, ACS Nano 2023, 17(5) 4091-4093". Students may use generative AI in this course to assist with early drafts, but final text must be in the student's own words, and the output must be checked for correctness and completeness (e.g. suggested references must be confirmed). A statement of how AI was used (if at all) must be included in all written reports and should be discussed with the research supervisor. Use of generative AI outside these guidelines or without citation will constitute academic dishonesty.

Each student must complete (in consultation with their supervisor) a project proposal outline by end of September. This should also include indication that all required safety training has been completed and will be pass/fail. The project proposal will be graded by the supervisor. The student and supervisor will ensure all required safety training has been completed.

Oral presentations will be delivered at the end of each semester, usually taking the format of 10-minute presentation followed by a 10-minute question period. The research supervisor is responsible for arranging the presentation and corresponding grading. Often the presentation will be made to the supervisor and the supervisor's research team.

Written reports will be submitted at the end of each semester to the research supervisor. While these are recommended to be 10-20 pages, the format and specific deadline is up to the research supervisor. Term 1 should focus on project planning and performing a literature review. Term 2 report should document the project in full, with major findings and analysis of data and limitations being covered. The report(s) may be prepared and submitted as a conference proceeding or journal publication instead of a formal report, as per the discretion and agreement of the student and supervisor.

Students are expected to maintain a lab notebook, documenting regular meetings and all work conducted on the project. It should be held to engineering standards for notebook records and will be submitted to the research supervisor along with the final report. The supervisor will assign a grade out of 15 on the research skills and involvement of the student.

6X04:

Students enrolled in the 600 level of the course will be expected to prepare an additional academic communique such as a symposium or conference poster, conference proceeding, or journal article based on the research completed under the direction of the supervisor. The 6X04 grade breakdown is as follows:

COURSE POLICY ON MISSED WORK, EXTENSIONS, AND LATE PENALTIES

1. Requests for extensions on written reports should be submitted directly to the research supervisor.
2. If the student is unable to attend their oral presentation they may present virtually or communicate with the course coordinator to arrange a rescheduled time. This will be at the convenience of the evaluators.

SUBMISSION OF REQUEST FOR RELIEF FOR MISSED ACADEMIC WORK

In the event of an absence for medical or other reasons, students should review and follow the Academic Regulation in the Undergraduate Calendar "Requests for Relief for Missed Academic Term Work".

1. **Relief for missed academic work worth less than 25% of the final grade resulting from medical or personal situations lasting up to three calendar days:**
 - Use the [McMaster Student Absence Form](#) (MSAF) on-line self-reporting tool. No further documentation is required.
 - Students may submit requests for relief using the MSAF once per term.
 - An automated email will be sent to the course instructor, who will determine the appropriate relief. Students must immediately follow up with their instructors. Failure to do so may negate the opportunity for relief.
 - The MSAF cannot be used to meet a religious obligation or to celebrate an important religious holiday.
 - The MSAF cannot be used for academic work that has already been completed attempted.
 - An MSAF applies only to work that is due within the period for which the MSAF applies, i.e. the 3-day period that is specified in the MSAF; however, all work due in that period can be covered by one MSAF.
 - The MSAF cannot be used to apply for relief for any final examination or its equivalent. See *Petitions for Special Consideration* above.
2. **For medical or personal situations lasting more than three calendar days, and/or for missed academic work worth 25% or more of the final grade, and/or for any request for relief in a term where the MSAF has been used previously in that term:**
 - Students must report to their Faculty Office to discuss their situation and will be required to provide appropriate **supporting documentation**.
 - If warranted, the Faculty Office will approve the absence, and the instructor will determine appropriate relief.
