COURSE INTENDED LEARNING OUTCOMES

By the end of this course, students should be able to:

- Understand the fundamental physics behind plasmas
- Perform simple calculations on plasmas in electric and magnetic fields.
- Recognize areas of application of plasma physics in Engineering

Calculational Tools:

A number of calculations will be performed in MatLab. MatLab is available from the university at no cost. You may also download Octave for free, it is basically identical to Matlab.
Python is another acceptable option.

COURSE FORMAT AND EXPECTATIONS

The course is three hours per week. The three hours will be divided into formal lectures, discussions of the reading material, and presenting solutions to problems.

Students will be asked to perform a simulation of a plasma under certain conditions.

Students will select a topic of their choice and make a presentation on that topic towards the end of the course.

If logistically possible, one lab will be performed (measuring the I-V characteristic of a plasma). A report on the lab will be submitted.

Class attendance is strongly recommended.

In the COVID-environment, classes will be held virtually through Microsoft Teams.
The lab may be replaced by an on-line exercise.

SUBMISSION OF REQUEST FOR RELIEF FOR MISSED ACADEMIC WORK

1. **Relief for missed academic work worth less than 25% of the final grade resulting from medical or personal situations lasting up to three calendar days:**

 - Students may submit requests for relief using the MSAF once per term.
 - An automated email will be sent to the course instructor, who will determine the appropriate relief. Students must immediately follow up with their instructors. Failure to do so may negate the opportunity for relief.

 - The MSAF cannot be used for academic work that has already been completed attempted.
 - An MSAF applies only to work that is due within the period for which the MSAF applies, i.e. the 3-day period that is specified in the MSAF; however, all work due in that period can be covered by one MSAF.
 - The MSAF cannot be used to apply for relief for any final examination or its equivalent. See *Petitions for Special Consideration* above.
2. **For medical or personal situations lasting more than three calendar days, and/or for missed academic work worth 25% or more of the final grade, and/or for any request for relief in a term where the MSAF has been used previously in that term:**
- Students must report to their Faculty Office to discuss their situation and will be required to provide appropriate **supporting documentation**.
 - If warranted, the Faculty Office will approve the absence, and the instructor will determine appropriate relief.
