**1. COURSE OBJECTIVES**

The goals of the course are to develop an understanding of the basics of hydrology and hydrologic modelling commonly encountered in civil engineering. Upon completion, the student will have:

- the competence in the specialized engineering knowledge of local and global hydrologic cycles (Attribute 1.2)
- the ability to perform infiltration calculations (Attribute 4.2)
- the competence to conduct hydrograph routing (Attribute 2.1)
- the ability to manage time and processes effectively, prioritizing competing demands to achieve personal and team goals and objectives (Attribute 6.1)
- the understanding of hydrologic statistics as well as rainfall and streamflow frequency analysis (Attribute 1.1 & 3.2)

**2. COURSE SPECIFIC POLICIES**

The topics in this course will be presented in a traditional lecture format, with emphasis on developing physical intuition and mathematical competency. Students are expected to attend and actively participate in the lectures. Tutorials will be used to review and practice key concepts presented in the lectures.

### **AUTHENTICITY / PLAGIARISM DETECTION**
