#### 5. LEARNING OUTCOMES

- The student will be able to develop VB.NET programs that use the fundamental constructs (looping, decisions, variables, arithmetic and logical operators) of programming.
- The student will be able to develop VB.NET programs that use form controls including buttons, text boxes, select lists, radio, checkbox, and will be able to manipulate their properties.
- The student will be able to describe the purpose of events and event handlers.
- The student will be able to create modularized VB.NET code that includes functions and sub procedures.
- The student will be able to analyze a simple engineering problem and develop a VB.NET application solution.
- The student will be able to develop VB.NET programs that read input from a file and output to a file.
- The student will be able to use complex data structures such as an array to store and manipulate data.
- The student will be able to use string handling functions to manipulate string data.

### **Requests for Relief for Missed Academic Term Work (Assignments, Mid-Terms, etc.)**

The McMaster Student Absence Form is an on-line self-reporting tool for **Undergraduate Students** to report absences for:

- 1) Relief for missed academic work worth less than 25% of the final grade resulting from medical or personal situations lasting up to three calendar days:
  - Students may submit a maximum of one academic work missed request per term. It is the responsibility of the student to follow up with instructors immediately (within the 3 day period that is specified in the MSAF) regarding the nature of the accommodation. All work due in that time period however can be covered by one MSAF.
  - MSAF cannot be used to meet religious obligation or celebration of an important religious holiday, for that has already been completed or attempted or to apply for relief for any final examination or its equivalent.
- 2) For medical or personal situations lasting more than three calendar days, and/or for missed academic work worth 25% or more of the final grade, and/or for any request for relief in a term where the MSAF has not been used previously in that term:
  - Students must visit their Associate Dean's Office (Faculty Office) and provide supporting documentation.
